In addition to "Night at Disneyland 2008", we will also hold our "Grad Night Party at Parkway Bowl" (not Kearny Mesa Bowl as previously advertised) on the night of graduation, June 16th. More information on this event will follow closer to that date.

## SOCIAL HOST LAW

In May 2006, a law was enacted in San Diego which says that adults who allow groups of three or more people under the age of 21 to drink alcohol in their homes can be charged with a misdemeanor, fined up to $\$ 1,000$, face up to 6 months in jail, and pay recovered costs of law enforcement and emergency services. A couple of additional points that some of the panel members that work with recovering teenage alcoholics shared are many teenagers that begin exhibiting issues with drinking have reported that role modeling in their homes was a factor - parents that demonstrate unhealthy drinking habits and alcohol dependency can con-

MISCELLANEOUS NEWS
Grade 10 California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) testing will take place on March 11 and 12. Sophomores should get a good night's sleep, eat a healthy breakfast, arrive to school on time. Water and dry snacks will be allowed in testing rooms. Please schedule appointments around these important test dates.

Over fifteen students from the Class of '07, who are now college freshmen, gave up some of their precious vacation sleeping time to share their college experiences as part of the Annual College Panel. The college freshmen met with students in the PAC and represented such campuses as Arizona State, Boston College, Cal Poly, New York University, Point Loma Nazarene University, UC Berkeley, UC Davis, UCLA, USC, and Washington University. Thanks to the PTSA for providing Pizza for the college freshman!

The Sophomore Parent Meeting was held on January 23rd in the PAC at 6:00 p.m., and the Junior Parent Meeting was conducted on January 31st in the PAC at 6:00 p.m. February 1st marked the end of the first semester, and grades were mailed home in the middle of February. The End of the First Grading Period for the second semester will be March 14th - students will bring home grades March 28th.

Advanced Placement information will be presented to students on February 14th in Advanced Placement classes. Registration for the Advanced Placement Exams will take place March 3-7, 2008, before school, during lunch, and after school, at the financial office window. Each exam will cost approximately $\$ 90.00$. Students who qualify for the lunch program may be eligible for a reduced price for exams. Families that suspect their student may qualify for the lunch program but haven't yet applied can pick up an application in the Cafeteria. Don't hesitate! Students will have an extended opportunity to register for exams from March 10-14, but will incur a $\$ 50$ late fee per exam. The Pre-AP Meeting for students will be held on April 22nd and 23rd in the PAC at lunchtime. Advanced Placement Exam dates are May 5th - 23 rd.

## CSF NEWS

The California Scholarship Federation (CSF) Membership Drive Week for the spring semester will take place February 18 through February 29, during lunch in room 853. A point system specified in the state constitution requires that students do "superior work" in every subject, and have satisfactory citizenship or better in each class. Retroactive membership may
not be granted after the designated membership drive. Students must fill out an application and have a copy of their previous semester report card along with $\$ 5$ for membership fees. Those who qualify for at least four out of six semesters during grades 10-12 are eligible for Sealbearer recognition at commencement, but must qualify at least one semester their senior year.

CSF members take an active part in the tutoring programs, which are available at Point Loma High School. Tutoring sessions in most subject areas are held after school from 2:15 p.m. to $3: 15$ p.m. in the library, Monday through Thursday or in a designated teacher's classroom. CSF members are actively involved in community/ school service. Meetings are held at lunch every Wednesday in room 853. Ms. Lynda McIntosh is the advisor.

SENIOR SCHOLARSHIPS
Members of the Class of 2008 can apply for approximately 50 in-school scholarships this spring. Scholarships are for students who will be attending two and four year colleges in fall. Applications and specific criteria for the Senior Scholarships are available beginning March 3rd on the Naviance Website, https://connection.naviance.com/fc/sig nin.php?hsid=pointloma. Senior scholarships are due March 28th (no exceptions!) These scholarships include: Two LaRoi Glover Scholarships valued at \$5,000 each, Rebecca Lenci Memorial Scholarship (\$5,000), David Wells Excellence in Athletics $(\$ 1,000)$, and many memorial scholarships established by community families. Names of award recipients will be announced at the Senior Awards Program on Thursday, June 5, 2008, at 6:00 p.m., in the Trepanier Gym.

Students (and not just seniors!) interested in scholarships should visit the Naviance Family Connection. ## STUDENT LEADERSHIP

OPPORTUNITIES
Several leadership opportunities are made available each spring to freshman and juniors. Freshmen were able to gain information and pick up applications at lunch in the Media Center on February 6 for the Aaron Price Fellows Program. This program is only open to freshman at four San Diego high schools. Students who are accepted will participate in three years of specially developed programs. Completed applications should be returned February 29th. Juniors who have strong leadership skills and a desire to work with others are invited to apply for several leadership programs. Camp Enterprise, sponsored by San Diego Rotary, is for students interested in business and marketing. It takes place in the San Diego Mountains and is cost-free. The Youth Citizenship Seminar is held each summer on the campus of Pepperdine University in Malibu, California. Boys and Girls State
leadership programs will take place the summer of 2008 for one male and one female junior. These seminar opportunities invite student leaders to meet with adult leaders in the fields of government and business.

Remember to file your financial aid forms as soon as possible. Complete and mail applications with late deadlines. Make sure that the Counseling Office has on hand your stamped, addressed envelope if mid-year reports need to be sent to colleges that request them. Be patient: this is a critical waiting period. Students should keep grades up and avoid "senioritis". Senior Exhibitions are May 29, 2008. Remember to order your Cap \& Gown! Apply for Scholarships - some are based on merit, others on financial need. Most colleges have $80 \%$ or more of their students getting assistance from scholarships and financial aid. Final grades for the Fall semester will help determine senior class rank. Valedictorian and Salutatorian were determined at the end of fall semester.

Application for San Diego's

Community Colleges: A representative from Mesa College will be here at Point Loma High School in the spring for placement exams in Math and English and orientation. Students can begin their application process right here at PLHS!

FAFSA - The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is currently available online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. This is the basic form which families must use in order to apply for federal, state and collegebased aid. Families should use their 2007 income tax information for this form. The first day to submit applications online was January 1, 2008. Priority deadline for Cal Grants is March 2, 2008.

For Seniors who are applying to 2year or 4-year colleges in California and want to qualify for Cal Grants, you won't need to do anything except file the FAFSA!! Our registrar will electronically file all seniors' GPA's to the state. We will be contacting you or your student if we don't have their social security number on file for this process. Thank you to Mrs. Holcomb and Mrs. Bellini for organizing our Financial Aid Night on January 15th! If you have any questions, please contact your student's counselor.

## PARENTS OF JUNIORS

Remember to have your juniors sign up for the spring SAT Reasoning Test, SAT Subject Tests, or ACT. Contact the College Board web site for more information www.collegeboard.com. Attend College Open houses and college fairs. Contact colleges of interest for their admissions information, sign up for summer college tours and plan ahead. Selective colleges want to know how a student spends his or her time outside the classroom. Admissions officers look at more than SAT and ACT scores, grades and letters of recommendation. SDSU received a record 61,492 freshman applications for fall 2008, of those, 49,735 were first-time freshmen applications. Last fall incoming SDSU freshmen had an average high school GPA of 3.44. This represents an increase from 3.16 a decade ago. SDSU plans to enroll 9,200 undergraduates next fall. UCSD received 45,054 applications this fall, while Cal Poly San Luis Obispo received over 37,760 applications, up 10\% from last year.

## Counceling Center News Continued

SUMMER PROGRAMS
The Counseling Office has information about summer programs for juniors. In addition, the library has several references, which may be checked out. It's important for students to have meaningful summer experiences. Many programs provide college credit. Programs can be academic, study abroad/international travel, outdoor adventure, community service, athletics, artistic or leadership oriented. Many college campuses offer pre-college summer programs for high school students. The University of California, as well as private universities such as Harvard, Cornell, Barnard, Brandeis and others, offers these programs as a way to introduce students to collegelevel classes. The Counseling Office, the library and the Internet are all good sources to tap if you are looking into summer programs.

## SUMMER SCHOOL

This year summer school will be held at Point Loma High School for students who need to make up Ds and Fs in core classes, namely English, Math, Social Studies, and Sciences. Summer school will begin on Thursday, June 19 and end on Thursday, July 31 (one session only.)

## THE REAL COST OF COLLEGE

When evaluating college costs, the first numbers people usually consider are tuition, room, and board. However, there are many expenses that aren't always noted and that you might not consider up front, but that are very real expenses. When budgeting for college be sure to consider:

FEES: Some fees are required of all students, some are related to a student's major (such as a science lab breakage deposit), and some are optional student activity fees.

BOOKS AND SUPPLIES: This figure varies according to major and whether or not a student purchases "new" or "used" textbooks. In addition, there may be lab workbooks or photocopied that don't always get figured in. Add 10 to 20 percent to the figure the college financial aid office provides.

FOOD: Be sure to add dates, splurges, or late-night snacks to your budget, since "board" fees only include school meal plans.

TRANSPORTATION AND TRAVEL: This includes both the cost of commuting back and forth from the local resi-
dence to classes and the cost of getting to and from home during vacations and breaks. If a car is involved, there are parking fees, insurance payments, gas, oil, and maintenance costs.

PERSONAL: Incidental expenditures, such as laundry, telephone, and entertainment.

MEDICAL AND DENTAL EXPENDITURES: While students can usually remain on a parent's health insurance plan while in school, some options may not be available if a student is away from home.

MISCELLANEOUS: Expenses beyond the basic cost of attending college, including fraternity/sorority dues, tutoring, summer programs, athletics, and club. Adapted from Conquer the Cost of College by Elizabeth Coté. Adapted from Kaplan

## PLAN AHEAD FOR YOUR COLLEGE FUTURE!

Yes, even underclass students can take action to prepare for college. Here are some tips high school students can take during the next few months provided by the National Association for College Admission Counseling.

## Freshman Students:

Build strong academic, language, mathematics, and critical thinking skills by taking challenging courses. Study hard and get excellent grades. Strengthen your vocabulary by increasing your reading. Become involved in co-curricular activities. Meet your counselor and discuss your plans for the next four years. Browse through college literature or surf the Web to get an idea of what kinds of schools may be of interest to you. Check out what high school courses they require. Know NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) requirements if you want to play sports in college. Keep an academic portfolio and co-curricular record. Research career possibilities. Begin saving money for college.

## Sophomore Students:

Receive PSAT results. Read materials sent with your score report. Consult your counselor to explore ways to improve on future standardized tests and courses to discuss which may be required or beneficial for your post-high school plans. Keep studying! Volunteer-a great way to
identify your interests and to develop skills. Remember it's not too early to start researching colleges and universities. Visit the counseling office to browse through literature and guidebooks or surf the web and check out college and university home pages.

## J unior Students:

Begin college selection process. Attend college fairs, financial aid seminars, general information sessions, etc., to learn as much as you can about the college application process. Make sure you are meeting NCAA requirements if you want to play Division I or II sports in college. See Laurie Hurl for NCAA information. Junior year grades are extremely important in the college admission process, because they are a measure of how well you do in advanced, upper-level courses. Grades also are used to determine scholarships and grants for which you may be eligible. So put in extra effort and keep those grades up! If you will require financial aid, start researching your options for grants, scholarships, and work-study programs. Begin to make a preliminary list of colleges you would like to investigate further. Surf the internet and use the college resources in the counseling office or library. Ask your parents for your Social Security Number (required on many college applications.) If you were never issued one, contact the closest Social Security office as soon a possible to obtain a number. You should be optimistic and realistic when applying to colleges. Register for the April SAT Reasoning Test if you have completed the math courses covered on the SAT Reasoning Test. If not, plan to take the SAT Reasoning Test in May or June.

## Life Skills Counseling Corner

Taking a Closer Look
It's easy to miss the signs of depression and to mistake a student's behavior as symptomatic of something else such as a learning disorder or substance abuse. Depression is not just feeling sad or being "down in the dumps" for a day or two, it is persistent and it impacts all areas of a student's life. It can be life threatening. Depression is a biochemical imbalance in the brain and it affects how students feel and think, how their bodies function and how they behave. Change is a clear warning sign that something is amiss. If you observe five or more of the following signs occurring every day over a period of two weeks, then referral is appropriate: depressed or irritable mood, declining interest in activities, feelings of worthlessness or guilt, indecision or decreased concentration, changes in sleeping habits, noticeable change in weight, body movement, fatigue and/or loss of energy, and thoughts about death or suicide.

## Thank-you Parents and Guardians!

I would like to thank all of the parents and guardians that have pledged to ensure all events in their home will be chaperoned, alcohol-free and drug-free. I look forward to more parents and guardians making this pledge that will help keep our students safe. A recent survey conducted by The National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse (CASA) at Columbia University found when teens are at an un-chaperoned party they are 16 times likelier to have alcohol available, 15 times likelier to have illegal and/or prescription drugs available and 29 times likelier to have marijuana available. Eighty percent of parents surveyed believed that alcohol and marijuana was not available at the parties their teens attended, whereas $50 \%$ of teen partygoers surveyed said that they attend parties where alcohol, drugs or both are available. One-third of the teens surveyed reported that adults are rarely or never preset at the parties they attend. CASA also found that teens attending three or more parties a month are at two-and-one-half times the risk for substance abuse compared to teens that do not attend parties.

## Other news

The month of February is Teen Dating Violence Prevention Month. What is Relationship Violence? A pattern of behavior used by someone to maintain control over his or her partner. It can take the form of verbal, physical emotional or even sexual abuse. Relationship violence is not about getting angry or having a disagreement. In an abusive relationship, one partner is afraid of or intimidated by the other. Abuse isn't just hitting. It's yelling, threatening, name calling, saying "I'll kill myself if you leave me", obsessive phone calling or texting, and extreme possessiveness. According to the National Sexual Violence Resource Center, 38\% of date rape victims are young women between age 14 and $17.70 \%$ of pregnant teenagers are abused by their partners. Use this time to talk to your teen about their dating and maybe ask what their friends are doing.
