# **SOCIAL HOST LAW**

In May 2006, a law was enacted in San Diego which says that adults who allow groups of three or more people under the age of 21 to drink alcohol in their homes can be charged with a misdemeanor, fined up to \$1,000, face up to 6 months in jail, and pay recovered costs of law enforcement and emergency services. A couple of additional points that some of the panel members that work with recovering teenage alcoholics shared are many teenagers that begin exhibiting issues with drinking have reported that role modeling in their homes was a factor - parents that demonstrate unhealthy drinking habits and alcohol dependency can con-

# PARENT ALERT

Just a reminder that it is illegal to contribute to the delinquency of a student. According to Penal Code 272 it is illegal for an adult to supply alcohol or drugs to any minor. You will be responsible for their welfare and held accountable for their actions.

#### **WORK PERMITS**

Working minors and their employers are reminded of the state law regarding work permits for youth less than 18 years of age. The minor is responsible for obtaining the permit and the employer is required to terminate the employment of any minor who does not have an active permit or has not made an application for one. All work permits must be renewed at the beginning of each school year. Please see Mrs. Eurich in Room 303 at lunch, before or after school to pick up a new application. A student that changes jobs at a later date will need to make a new application for a new work permit. Permits are good until the end of August 2008. During the summer all students are eligible for work permits.

#### JUNIOR AND SENIOR AWARDS PROGRAMS

The Junior Awards Program will honor underclass students for their achievements on Thursday, April 24, 2008, at 2:30 p.m.; seniors will receive cash awards, certificates, and honors at the gala Senior Awards Program on Thursday, June 5, 2008 at 6:30 p.m. Both programs will be held in Trepanier Gym.

#### TESTING IS COMING and TESTING IS A TEAM EFFORT!

It's that time of the year again when we will be gathering together our 9th, 10th, 11th graders to take the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program Tests (STAR). With the exception of the seniors, all students will be tested April 24-29, 2008, and it is important that all students give it their best effort. Please do not schedule personal or optional medical appointments during these days.

The results of the STAR testing program are important to everyone in the Point Loma community. They are used to calculate the Academic Performance Index (API) for Point Loma High School, which is used to rank us against other high schools. The API ranking is published for the public to see, and is a direct reflection on the school and the community.

Perhaps most importantly, the results of the STAR testing tell us, the staff at PLHS, how well we are preparing our students for a competitive world. We need everyone to give 100% on these tests, so the results accurately reflect what our young people know, as well as how well we are instructing them.

We are aware that April and May is a very busy time of the year for our students in terms of testing. Therefore, we have done our best to schedule the STAR testing so as not to conflict with the Advanced Placement (AP) exams. After giving it their best on the CST exam, students who will be taking AP exams the following week should have plenty of time to pull out their notes and the book to study for the AP's. We will be AP testing in late May in order to give AP students more time in class to review for the exams. We're counting on all Pointers to excel on all their exams.

Just as our Pointer athletes train hard and strive for victory in all sports - we need all Pointers to come together as a team to succeed in this academic endeavor, and make everyone in the Point Loma community proud to be a Pointer. Go Pointers!

#### Here are some testing tips:

- Get plenty of rest the night before any exam.
- Eat a nutritious breakfast the morning of the exam, having food in your student's stomach will give energy and help to focus on the exam. Avoid heavy foods which can make student groggy.
- ✓ Set the alarm and have a back-up as well.
- Read the test directions slowly and carefully.
- Skim through the test so you have a good idea how to pace yourself.

#### SAT Reasoning and Subject Tests, ACT

The last SAT Reasoning Test & SAT Subject Tests are May 3rd and June 7th. Registration deadline for the May test was April 1 and for the June date May 6. Current juniors can save time by registering early for fall tests. ACT last tests are April 12th and June 14th. Registration deadlines for the April date was March 7 and for the June date May 9th.

#### ADVANCED PLACEMENT EXAMS

AP Exams will be given in May. Pre-registration was held March 3 through March 7. The fee this year is \$90 per exam. Students who missed the pre-registration week were able to register March 10 through 14, but were charged a late fee of \$50 per exam. All students enrolled in an AP course must take the AP Exam in order to receive AP course credit. Students should decide ahead of time which college(s) they would like their scores sent to. Scores can be sent to additional colleges later, but for a fee. There will be Mandatory Pre Administration days for the AP test takers to fill out pre-exam information. Students with the last names A-L will gather on April 22 and M-Z on April 23 in the PAC at lunch time. Prep materials, such as practice tests, study guides and testtaking tips, may be available. Ask vour AP teachers and counselor for more information.

#### SUMMER SCHOOL-Thursday, June 19 Wednesday, July 30, 2008 (Six Weeks)

Will be held at PLHS! This program is for our students who received a "D" or "F" grade in a previous English, Science, Math, or History course. The purpose of this program is to give the students an opportunity to earn a higher grade and/or high school credit.

For students who currently ride the bus to school (on the VEEP or PISC-No Child Left Behind Programs), transportation will be provided. Students will receive credit upon successful completion of the course. Students will be dropped from Summer School after 2 absences, NO EXCEPTIONS.

We strongly encourage you to allow your student to take advantage of this opportunity. For more information, contact the counseling office.

#### PLAN AHEAD FOR YOUR COLLEGE FUTURE!

Yes, even underclass students can take action to prepare for college. Here are some tips high school students can take during the next few months provided by the National Association for College Admission Counseling.

#### Senior Students:

Spring is a very rewarding time as our students begin receiving their college acceptances. It is very gratifying to hear students joyfully exclaim they were accepted to X, Y, or Z College or University. In all the excitement, it is easy for seniors to forget to complete their intent to register forms by May 1st and to follow all procedures from the college regarding securing student housing. Many colleges require students to take English and/or Math placement tests prior to enrollment. It is important to read all information sent to them from the colleges so they don't miss out on important deadlines.

#### SAN DIEGO COMMUNITY COLLEGES

A representative from Mesa College will be on our campus to provide information and allow student to participate in their community college orientation. Students who plan on attending City or Miramar can also meet with the Mesa rep. More information will be website, posted our school www.pointlomahigh.com, the school bulletin, and Naviance in the future.

PLHS community scholarships were due April 4th; late applications were not accepted! Seniors will continue to have the opportunity to apply for many scholarships. Notification is given to students on Naviance.

#### THE SOCIAL TRANSITION FROM HIGH SCHOOL TO COLLEGE

Teen in high school are drinking more than ever and starting drinking at even younger ages. The incidence of high-risk drinking only increases in college when children find themselves with new freedom away from watchful eyes of parents consider these facts:

\*Student who chose not to drink during high school will often start during their first year of college. Moderate high school drinkers often become heavy drinkers in college.

\* Teens who use alcohol before the age of 15 are four times more likely to be alcohol dependent than adults whose first drink is at the legal age of 21.

\*Each fall, 15 million students enroll n college. Nearly 160,000 of today's first year college student students leave school every year for alcohol and other drug related reasons.

#### COLLEGE INSURANCE COVERAGE

If your kids are heading off to college, especially for the first time, you probably need to fine-tune your insurance coverage. Your auto premiums should drop if your child doesn't take a family car to school, assuming the college is more than 100 miles away. For students with cars on campus, notify your insurer of the new location. If it's out of state, make sure you comply with that state's laws for minimum coverage. If your child has a t least a B average, ask for good-student discount.

For a child living in a dorm, your homeowner's policy may cover personal belongings up to 10% of your own content coverage. If you need more, you can purchase a rider. Students in off-campus-housing will need renter's insurance for property and liability. Roommates often can share a policy. Your health insurance covers unmarried children who are full-time students up to age 20 to 25, depending on the insurer. If you're in an HMO, make sure the college is within your service area. When your children reach the age limit, or get married, they qualify for COBRA coverage through your employer. (Info taken from Business Week/September 15, 2003, Larry Armstrong).

#### TIPS FOR SENIOR PARENTS ON LETTING GO

The Emotional Roller Coaster: Recognize your student's conflicting emotions. Your student, like you, is being pulled between past, present and future. One day exclaiming, "Leave me alone; I'm 18 years old, and independent," and the next complaining, "You're never around when I need you!" Your student's ups and downs are a sign of the ambivalence of the transitional time. This summer: make a financial plan and discuss expectations with your student. Develop a tentative budget and be clear about who will pay for what. For example, some parents pay for tuition, room/board, books and supplies, while their student is responsible for incidental expenses such as snacks, movies and CD's. Other students are responsible for earning a percentage of their tuition. Teach your student about responsible use of credit and debit cards. Communication: Keeping in touch once they're at college - Ask about courses, rather than focusing on grades. Invite your student to share with you the discovery of new ideas, academic interests and intellectual passions.

#### THINGS TO DO IN APRIL

- Expect Admission Decisions Chances are you will be accepted (or put on a waiting list) at some colleges and not others. Congratulate yourself on your acceptances. Way to go!
- Decide which college to go to
- Consider all the pros and cons
- Get the opinions of your parent(s) and counselor
- When comparing financial aid offers, look at the kinds of aid offered (for example, loans versus grants) - not just the total amount.
- Let your counseling or college planning office know of your final decision.
- Reply to colleges
- Notify the college your chose of your decision. Send a deposit,

if needed. Watch deadlines. Mark them on this calendar. Most colleges may require deposits by May 1.

After making sure everything is in order with the college you choose, write a polite letter to the colleges that you did not choose. Thank them for their offer. Do this promptly so they can offer admission to another student.

#### Tips of the month

**\$\$\$\$**: Get into the habit of working with a financial budget. Set a spending limit and savings goal based on your monthly income (allowances, after-tax pay, etc.). Put your savings amount away. Then prioritize how you want to use the rest of your money. That way, you can have what you really want and still save money! Look for a summer job or internship to offset the cost of college.

**Going to the prom?** Have fun and be smart. Remember that alcohol and other drugs can lead you take risks you may regret later. Buckle up and don't let anyone pressure you into doing something you don't want to do.

#### THINGS TO DO IN MAY

- Thank teachers and others who wrote recommendations. Consider giving them a thank-you note or card.
- Keep in touch with wait-list schools you would still like to attend. Consider writing a letter to express your enthusiasm for attending. Let the colleges know of significant recent achievements, such as high grades, awards or honors.
- Make plans for the summer and beyond. Forms regarding housing, roommates, courses, etc., may start arriving from the college you'll be attending. Respond to all of these promptly.

Stay focused and keep studying-only a couple more months to go!

#### **Junior Students:**

**March:** If you haven't logged into the Naviance program yet, now is the time to start. Write, telephone, or use the internet to request admissions literature and financial aid information from the colleges on your list. There is no charge and no obligation to obtain general information about admission and financial aid.

**April:** Register for the May/June SAT Reasoning Test and/or the May/June SAT Subject Tests. Register for the June ACT if you want to take that test. Continue to evaluate your list of colleges and universities. Eliminate colleges from the original list that no longer interest you and add others as appropriate. Look into summer jobs or apply for special summer academic or enrichment programs. Colleges love to see students using their knowledge and developing their skills and interests.

May: Get a jump start on summer activities-consider enrolling in an academic course at a local college, pursuing a summer school program, applying for an internship, working or volunteering. If you work, save part of your earnings for college. Begin visiting colleges. Phone to set up appointments. Interviews are always a good idea. Many colleges will tell you they are optional, but an interview will show interest, enthusiasm, and initiative on your part and provide an excellent opportunity to have your questions answered. Do a practice interview with your family, employer, or a senior who has had college interviews. Set up interviews as early as possible-interview times become booked quickly! Take the SAT Reasoning Test or the SAT Subject Tests.

**June:** Get on the road to visit colleges. Taking a tour and talking to students can be the greatest help in deciding whether or not a school is right for you. Admission offices employ their students to give tours and answer questions from perspective students and their parents. Take the SAT Reasoning Test, the SAT Subject Tests, and/or the ACT.

**July:** Visit colleges, take tours, have interviews, and ask questions. Make college visiting a family event. Involve your parents and siblings in every step of your application process. Choosing the right college is a tough decision; the opinions of those who know you best can provide helpful insight into which college is best for you.

August: If you plan to play Division I or II athletics in college, you will need to visit the NCAA Clearinghouse website, ncaa.org, to fill out the NCAA Clearinghouse form. You should print three copies, one for your records and two to give to Mrs. Hurl. See Laurie Hurl if you have any questions.

#### LET THE COUNSELING OFFICE KNOW WHERE YOU PLAN TO ATTEND COLLEGE!

#### JUNIOR NEWS THINGS TO DO IN APRIL

- Register for the May or June SAT Reasoning Test and any SAT Subject Tests (II's) that are applicable
- ✗ Have your junior take the STAR testing seriously. It is to their advantage to take the voluntary Early Assessment Program Exam. If they are proficient, they may pass the entrance requirements for Math and English at the CSU system and will not have to take the ELM/EPT.
- Plan your senior year schedule of classes. Try to include as many advance or honors courses as possible
- ✗ Prepare for the May or June SAT Take the exams now. This will give you enough time to retake the exams in the fall if you are not satisfied with your scores
- ✗ This summer visit colleges, continue working in your field of interest, and be sure to leave time for recreation.
- X Start to think about personal statement topics
- ✗ See Mrs. Tolpen for summer job/programs for juniors.

- X Open a savings and checking account and learn how to manage it.
- Student Athletes register with NCAA to qualify for athletic scholarships at: www.ncaaclearinghouse.net

#### COLLEGE CAMPUS VISIT ADVICE

Juniors should visit during spring and summer months. If you're considering a summer visit, check with the college first. Some campuses are dead in the summer; others have summer program for juniors or summer school. Attend an information session and/or interview, tour campus, visit classes, talk with students and faculty, meet with a coach, and eat on campus. Consider staying overnight in the residence halls. Ask questions and learn as much as you can about the university community. Look up US news online for more information at www.usnews.com/usnews/edu/college/find/covisits.htm

Make good use of the summer. Consider taking a course that you can apply toward college. Explore volunteering, internships and job possibilities. Spend time with your family and friends.

#### **Sophomore Students:**

April: Register for June SAT Subject Test. These are one-hour exams testing you on academic subjects that you have already completed. Among the many to choose from are biology, chemistry, foreign languages, and physics. Many colleges require three SAT Subject Tests. Some colleges recommend/require Math Level 1 or Math Level 2. Not all SAT Subject Tests are given on every test date. Check the calendar carefully to determine when the Subject Tests you want are offered. Continue to research career options and consider possible college majors that will help you achieve your career doals.

**June:** Take the SAT Subject Tests that you registered for in April. Consider electing score choices so you can see your test scores before deciding whether to release the results to colleges. It's a good idea to plan on taking the SAT Subject Tests again in the spring of your junior year or the fall of your senior year. You then have the option of releasing only your best scores to colleges. If you work, save some of your earnings for college.

**July:** During the summer, you may want to sign up for a PSAT/SAT prep course, use computer software, or do the practice tests in books designed to familiarize you with standardized tests.

August: Make your summer productive. Continue reading to increase your vocabulary.

#### FRESHMEN YEAR COLLEGE PLANNING

- X Start strong and post solid grades
- Get involved in after-school activities - this is your opportunity to try out a few different options. At least one should be social or community service.
- Plan your 10th grade schedule if you have done well in your freshmen classes, consider honors or advanced courses
- X Plan to work, travel, or volunteer over the summer.

# Life Skills Counseling Corner

The month of February was Teen Dating Violence Prevention Month. What is relationship violence? It is a pattern of behavior used by someone to maintain control over his or her partner. It can take the form of verbal, physical, emotional, or even sexual abuse. Relationship violence is not about getting angry or having a disagreement. In an abusive relationship, one partner is afraid of or intimidated by the other. Abuse isn't just hitting; it's yelling, threatening, name calling, saying "I'll kill myself if you leave me," obsessive phone calling or texting, and extreme possessiveness. According to the National Sexual Violence Resource Center, 38% of date rape victims are young women between the age of 14 and 17. Seventy percent of pregnant teenage girls are abused by their partners. Talk to your teen about their dating and maybe ask what their friends are doing.

\*April is Alcohol Awareness Month. Do you know: Although there has been a significant decline in tobacco and illicit drug use among teens, underage drinking has remained at consistently high levels. It is estimated there are 11 million underage drinkers in the United States. Nearly 7.2 million are considered binge drinkers, typically meaning they drank more than five drinks on (one) occasion; and more than two million are classified as heavy drinkers.

**Do you know: There is a "Social Host Law" in California?** The Social Host Law makes hosts liable and prevents underage drinking parties. Consequences of hosting underage parties where alcohol is served can include being charged with a misdemeanor; fined up to \$1,000; face six months in jail; and pay recovered costs of law enforcement's and emergency services. Underage drinking is illegal and can lead to death, unintentional injuries, vehicle crashes, homicide and suicide.
