Before summer, you will see signs of construction. A new two story building will take the place of the bungalows. It will house 6 classrooms and an athletic training facility. Construction to turn the upper half of the 900 building into a state-of-the-art Music Center is planned to start this summer. The lower half of the 900 building will follow shortly thereafter to become an incredible Motion Picture Studio. I've been told it is the only one of its caliber on a high school campus.

## 2009-2010 BOARD POSITIONS

As we move into the second half of the school year, we are already scouting our upcoming Point Loma High Association Board and committee chairs and volunteers (worker bees) for the following year. Here is a listing of board and committee descriptions. We invite you to consider stepping up and becoming involved in a fabulous organization here at PLHS. Volunteer for one or more activity or take the big step and take on the Board positions!

PRESIDENT: coordinates the work of officers and committees, resides over meetings of association and executive board, prepares directory of officers and committee chairs, agenda, is liaison between principal, staff and board.


VICE PRESIDENT OF VOLUNTEER ACTIVITIES: oversees the following committees - Grad Night (senior class activities), College Night (assists Head Counselor in preparing for and putting on the annual College Night in the fall), and Hospitality.

Hospitality is divided into several small activities and volunteers are needed for each activity. Grade 10 California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) testing will take place on March 17 and 18. Sophomores should get a good night's sleep, eat a healthy breakfast, and arrive to school on time. Water and dry snacks will be allowed in testing rooms. Please schedule appointments around these important test dates.

## Parent Meetings

The Sophomore Parent Meeting was held on February $12^{\text {th }}$, and the Junior Parent Meeting was conducted on February $19^{\text {th }}$. Both events were held in the PAC.


The California Scholarship Federation (CSF) Membership Drive Week for the spring semester will take place in Room 853 February 17 th through February 27th, during lunch. A point system specified in the state constitution requires that students do "superior work" in every subject, and have satisfactory citizenship or better in each class. Retroactive membership may not be granted after the designated membership drive. Students must fill out an application and have a copy of their previous semester report card along with $\$ 5$ for membership fees. Those who qualify for at least four out of six semesters during grades 10-12 are eligible for Sealbearer recognition at commencement, but must qualify at least one semester their senior year.

CSF members take an active part in the tutoring programs, which are available at Point Loma High School. Tutoring sessions in most subject areas are held after school Monday through Thursday from 2:15 p.m. to $3: 15 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. in the library, or in a designated teacher's classroom. CSF members are actively involved in community/school service. Meetings are held at lunch every Wednesday in Room 853. Ms. Lynda McIntosh is the advisor.

## SNODENM 4FADFDSEID OPDORNONTMIAS

Several leadership opportunities are made available each spring to freshmen and juniors. The Aaron Price Fellows Program application and information were made available in the Media Center on February 5. This program is only open to freshmen at four San Diego high schools. Students who are accepted will participate in three years of specially developed programs. Completed applications should be returned by February $20^{\text {th }}$. The Youth Citizenship Seminar is held each summer on the campus of Pepperdine University in Malibu, California. Boys and Girls State leadership programs will take place the summer of 2009 for one male and one female junior. These seminar opportunities invite student leaders to meet with adult leaders in the fields of government and business.

## SENIOR SCHOLARSHIPS

Members of the Class of 2009 can apply for approximately 50 in-school scholarships this spring. Scholarships are for students who will be attending two and four year colleges in fall. Applications and specific criteria for the Senior Scholarships will be available beginning March $2^{\text {nd }}$ on the Naviance website, https://connection.naviance.com/fc/ signin.php?hsid=pointloma. Senior scholarship applications are due March $30^{\text {th }}$ (no exceptions!) These scholarships include: Two LaRoi Glover Scholarships valued at $\$ 5,000$ each, Rebecca Lenci Memorial Scholarship ( $\$ 5,000$ ), David Wells Excellence in Athletics ( $\$ 1,000$ ), and many memorial scholarships established by community families. Names of award recipients will be announced at the Senior Awards Program on Thursday, June 4, 2009, at 6:00 p.m., in the Trepanier Gym.

Students (and not just seniors!) interested in scholarships should visit the Naviance Family Connection. A link to this website, www.connection.naviance.com, is located on our school's website, www.pointlomahigh.com. A default password is required for students entering this site for the first time. Students should see Maddie Tolpen in Counseling for their default password. Many applications are also available in the Counseling Office. There are zillions of scholarship opportunities on the web; one such website is www.fastweb.com. Start surfing the net, you'd be surprised what you'll find!

In order for students to be recognized for any scholarship award, a copy of the notification letter must be submitted to the Counseling Office. The deadline to submit any/all scholarship award notifications is Friday, May 22, 2009.

## PARTNTSOT SHNTORS

Remember to file your financial aid forms as soon as possible. Complete and mail applications with late deadlines. Make sure that the Counseling Office has on hand your stamped, addressed envelope if mid-year reports need to be sent to colleges that request them. Be patient: this is a critical waiting period. Students should keep grades up and avoid "senioritis." Senior Exhibitions are May 28, 2009. Remember to order your Cap \& Gown! Apply for Scholarships some are based on merit, others on financial need. Most colleges have $80 \%$ or more of their students getting assistance from scholarships and financial aid. Final grades for the Fall semester will help determine senior class rank. Valedictorian and Salutatorian were determined at the end of fall semester.

Application for San Diego's Community Colleges: A representative from Mesa College will be here at Point Loma High School in the spring for an Application Workshop and administering placement exams in Math and English. Students can begin their application process right here at PLHS!

FAFSA - The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is currently available online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. This is the basic form which families must use in order to apply for federal, state and college-based aid. Families should use their 2008 income tax information for this form. The first day to
submit applications online was January 1, 2009. Priority deadline for Cal Grants is March 2, 2009.

For Seniors who are applying to 2-year or 4-year colleges in California and want to qualify for Cal Grants, you won't need to do anything except file the FAFSA!! Our registrar will electronically file all seniors' GPA's to the state. We will be contacting you or your student if we don't have their social security number on file for this process. Thank you to Mrs. Valot and Mrs. Valenzuela for organizing our Financial Aid Night on January $13^{\text {th }}$ ! If you have any questions, please contact your student's Counselor.


Remember to have your juniors sign up for the spring SAT Reasoning Test, SAT Subject Tests, or ACT. Our school code is 052870 . Log onto the College Board or ACT web site for more information www.collegeboard.com, www.act.org. Attend College Open houses and college fairs. Contact colleges of interest for their admissions information, sign up for summer college tours and plan ahead. Selective colleges want to know how a student spends his or her time outside the classroom. Admissions officers look at more than SAT and ACT scores, grades and letters of recommendation. SDSU received 41,608 first-time freshmen applications for fall 2009; of those, 11,022
applications coming from the San Diego area. Last fall incoming SDSU freshmen had an average high school GPA of 3.47. SDSU plans to enroll 7,500 freshmen next fall. UCSD received 47,025 applications this fall, down 0.7 percent, while Cal Poly San Luis Obispo received over 20,722 applications, a 14 percent decline from last year.

## SUMMER

PROGRAMS
Information about summer programs is posted on Naviance, listed under the "Colleges" then "Enrichment Programs" tabs. This information is also available in hard copy form in the Counseling Office. In addition, the library has several references, which may be checked out. It's important for students to have meaningful summer experiences. Many programs provide college credit. Programs can be academic, study abroad/ international travel, outdoor adventure, community service, athletics, artistic or leadership oriented. Many college campuses offer pre-college summer programs for high school students. The University of California, as well as private universities such as Harvard, Cornell, Barnard, Brandeis and others, offers these programs as a way to introduce students to collegelevel classes. The Counseling Office, the library and the Internet are all good sources to tap if you are looking into summer programs.

## CREATING YOUR NAVIANCE FAMILY CONNECTION ACCOUNT

1. Sign up for "Family Connection."

Go to our school website, pointlomahigh.com, click on the Naviance Family Connection link located on the bottom left side of the main page.
Type in your registration code given to you by your counselor.
Once you are registered, type your email address and create a password.
In the future, you will sign in under "Return User" and won't need your registration code.
2. Complete your "Game Plan."

Under "ABOUT ME" select "My Game Plan" from the menu.
Complete the survey.
3. Select perspective colleges.

Under "ABOUT COLLEGE" select "College Search" from the menu on the burnt orange field.
Complete the survey. When completed, click "Show Matches."
Look under "Colleges That Match Your Criteria" and click on "Pick" next to the colleges that interest you. Choose all that interest you. At the very least, choose five. Under "Hand-Picked List" box click "Add to My Colleges."
If you have more colleges you'd like to include, go to "ABOUT ME" and select "My Colleges." Click on "Add to This List." Click on "Lookup" then type in name of college. Click on the desired college and then click on "Add Colleges" at the bottom of the page.

If you have any questions about Naviance Family Connection, please see your counselor.

When evaluating college costs, the first numbers people usually consider are tuition, room, and board. However, there are many expenses that aren't always noted and that you might not consider up front, but that are very real expenses. When budgeting for college be sure to consider:

FEES: Some fees are required of all students, some are related to a student's major (such as a science lab breakage deposit), and some are optional student activity fees.

BOOKS AND SUPPLIES: This figure varies according to major and whether or not a student purchases "new" or "used" textbooks. In addition, there may be lab workbooks or photocopies that don't always get figured in. Add 10 to 20 percent to the figure the college financial aid office provides.

FOOD: Be sure to add dates, splurges, or latenight snacks to your budget, since "board" fees only include school meal plans.

TRANSPORTATION AND TRAVEL: This includes both the cost of commuting back and forth from the local residence to classes and the cost of getting to and from home during vacations and breaks. If a car is involved, there are parking fees, insurance payments, gas, oil, and maintenance costs.

PERSONAL: Incidental expenditures, such as laundry, telephone, and entertainment.

MEDICAL AND DENTAL EXPENDITURES. While students can usually remain on a parent's health insurance plan while in school, some options may not be available if a student is away from home.

MISCELLANEOUS: Expenses beyond the basic cost of attending college, including fraternity/ sorority dues, tutoring, summer programs, athletics, and club.

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## PLAN AHEAD FOR YOUR COLLEGE FUTURE!

Yes, even underclass students can take action to prepare for college. Here are some tips high school students can take during the next few months provided by the National Association for College Admission Counseling.

## Freshman Students:

Receive your PSAT results. Read materials sent with your score report. Build strong academic, language, mathematics, and critical thinking skills by taking challenging courses. Study hard and get excellent grades. Strengthen your vocabulary by increasing your reading. Become involved in co-curricular activities. Meet your counselor and discuss your plans for the next four years. Browse through college literature or surf the Web to get an idea of what kinds of schools may be of interest to you. Check out what high school courses they require. Know NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) requirements if you want to play sports in college. Keep an academic portfolio and co-curricular record. Research career possibilities. Begin saving money for college.

## Sophomore Students:

Receive PSAT results. Read materials sent with your score report. Consult your counselor to explore ways to improve on future standardized tests and courses to discuss which may be required or beneficial for your post-high school plans. Keep studying! Volunteer - a great way to identify your interests and to develop skills. Remember, it's not too early to start researching colleges and universities. Visit the counseling office to browse through literature and guidebooks or surf the web and check out college and university home pages.

## Junior Students:

Begin college selection process. Attend college fairs, financial aid seminars, general information sessions, etc., to learn as much as you can about the college application process. Make sure you are meeting NCAA requirements if you want to play Division I or II sports in college. See Laurie Hurl for

NCAA information. Junior year grades are extremely important in the college admission process, because they are a measure of how well you do in advanced, upper-level courses. Grades also are used to determine scholarships and grants for which you may be eligible. So put in extra effort and keep those grades up! If you will require financial aid, start researching your options for grants, scholarships, and work-study programs. Begin to make a preliminary list of colleges you would like to investigate further. Surf the internet and use the college resources in the counseling office or library. Ask your parents for your Social Security Number (required on many college applications). If you were never issued one, contact the closest Social Security office as soon as possible to obtain a number. You should be optimistic and realistic when applying to colleges. Register for the April SAT Reasoning Test if you have completed the math courses covered on the SAT Reasoning Test. If not, plan to take the SAT Reasoning Test in May or June.

## Senior Students:

Stay focused and keep studying - only a couple more months to go!

> The Top Ten Things that Parents Should Remember About the College Process

It is good, of course, that students and parents approach this process jointly, but we all know that at its best, the process itself can prepare students for the independence that they will experience in college. The following list contains some possible symptoms of parental over involvement.
10. Remember that this process is not about you. No matter how similar your children may be to you, they need to make their own decisions and observations.
9. Support and encouragement are more appropriate than pressure and unsolicited advice. Allow your children to seek you out and restrain yourself from imposing your viewpoint upon them.
8. Do not use the words "we" or "our" when referring to your children's application process. Those little pronouns are surefire indicators that you have become too involved.
7. Help them prepare but let them perform. Encourage them to sleep well and put thought into a college visit, but once on campus, step back and let them drive the experience. This is good practice for the next phase of their lives adulthood.
6. Encourage your children to make their own college appointments, phone calls, and e-mails. When a family arrives at an admissions office, it's important that the student approach the front desk, not the parents. We notice! Having control over those details gives them a sense of ownership. Don't be tempted by the excuse that "I'm just saving them time" or "they are too busy" - students will learn to appreciate all the steps it takes to make big things happen if they do them.
5. Allow your children to ask the questions. They have their own set of issues that are important to them.
4. Prepare your children for disappointment. For many students this is the first time they could face bad news. Remind them there is no perfect school and that admissions decisions do not reflect on their worth as people or your worth as parents.
3. Never complete any portion of the college application - yes, even if it is just busy work. That also goes for friends, siblings, counselors, and secretaries. For many colleges, that overstep would be viewed as a violation of the honor policy at the school.
2. Do not let stereotypes or outdated information steer your children away from schools in which they would otherwise have an interest. Times have changed and so have colleges.

## And the \#1 Thing for Parents to Remember about the College Search Process is:

1. Never, ever, during a college visit buy a sweatshirt or t-shirt from the bookstore in your size - it's a dead giveaway!
