PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Pointer Families and Friends,

Our campus continues to be energized as our seniors begin to receive acceptance letters and scholarships from all over the country. This is an exciting time as they make final decisions on attending four-year universities, junior colleges and career and technical schools. Most California State Universities have waitlists due to the large number of applicants. Be sure to ask your counselor about this situation and strategies for admittance, which might involve enrollment in a special transfer admittance guarantee program. All students and families please read the article by our Head Counselor, Laurie Hurl, regarding San Diego State University's new admission policy.

Prop S projects are progressing, including the i21 initiative, whole-site modernization, a restroom/concession stand/ticket booth, and a new weight room, which is the most recent undertaking. Our Pointer Association and FPC (Facilities Planning and Construction) will work together to build a weight room, a project made possible by a \$90,000 grant from Jimmy Johnson (NASCAR) and Lowes. On our website homepage you will see a "PLHS Prop S Update" tab. The latest news regarding Prop S projects will be posted there.

Also, on our website home page we will have a new section called "School Highlights and Innovations." PLHS provides numerous opportunities for its students, sometimes beyond the campus; for example, 100 students are now participating in career/course internships through our Capstone College, Career & Technical Education classes.

At this time of year we plan for state testing (STAR). Testing will take place beginning the last week of April. The testing results determine our Academic Performance Index (API) and contribute to our Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) as a school. Please take the time to discuss the significance of the tests with your student and encourage him/her to do their very best. Thank you for your support from home.

Also during the month of May, we will be administering the Advanced Placement tests. For seniors it is an extra





TESTING IS COMING — TESTING IS A TEAM EFFORT!

It's that time of the year again when we will be gathering together our 9th, 10th and 11th graders to take the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program Tests (STAR). With the exception of the seniors, all students will be tested April 27 - May 6, 2010, and it is important that all students give it their best effort. Please do not schedule personal or optional medical appointments during these days.

The results of the STAR testing program are important to everyone in the Point Loma community. They are used to calculate the Academic Performance Index (API) for Point Loma High School, which is used to rank us against other high schools. The API ranking is published for the public to see, and is a direct reflection on the school and the community.

Perhaps most importantly, the results of the STAR testing tell us, the staff at PLHS, how well we are preparing our students for a competitive world. We need everyone to give 100% on these tests, so the results accurately reflect what our young people know, as well as how well we are instructing them.

We are aware that April and May is a very busy time of the year for our students in terms of testing. Therefore, we have done our best to schedule the STAR testing so as not to conflict with the Advanced Placement (AP) exams. After giving it their best on the CST exam, students who will be taking AP exams the following week should have plenty of time to pull out their notes and the book to study for the AP's. We will be AP testing in late May in order to give AP students more time in class to review for the exams. We're counting on all Pointers to excel on all their exams.

Just as our Pointer athletes train hard and strive for victory in all sports - we need all Pointers to come together as a team to succeed in this academic endeavor, and make everyone in the Point Loma community proud to be a Pointer. Go Pointers!

Test Taking tips:

- Get plenty of rest the night before any exam.
- Eat a nutritious breakfast the morning of the exam, having food in your student's stomach will give energy and help to focus on the exam. Avoid heavy foods that can make student groggy.
- Set the alarm and have a back up as well.
- Read the test directions slowly and carefully.
- Skim through the test so you have a good idea how to pace yourself.

SAT REASONING AND SUBJECT TESTS AND ACT

The last SAT Reasoning Test & SAT Subject Tests are May 1st and June 5th. Registration deadline for the May test was March 25th and for the June date is April 29th. ACT last tests are April 10th and June 12th. Registration deadlines for the April date was March 5th and for the June date is May 7th. Current Juniors can save time by registering early for fall tests. Selective private institutions may require three SAT Subject Tests. Visit Naviance to view specific admission criteria.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT EXAMS

AP Exams will be given in May. All students enrolled in an AP course must take the AP Exam in order to receive AP course credit. Students should decide ahead of time which college(s) they would like their scores sent to. Scores can be sent to additional colleges later, but for a fee.

Work permits

Working minors and their employers are reminded of the state law regarding work permits for youth younger than 18 years of age. The minor is responsible for obtaining the permit and the employer is required to terminate the employment of any minor who does not have an active permit or has not made an application for one. All work permits must be renewed at the beginning of each school year. Please see Mrs. Eurich in Room 303 at lunch, before or after school to pick up a new application. A student that changes jobs at a later date will need to make a new application for a new work permit. Permits are good until the first week of each new school year. - 2.0 Citizenship
- Point Loma High School ID card required
- Adequate progress towards graduation
- Required number of credits for grade level
- Required courses completed for the previous grade level
- Record of satisfactory attendance. (No truants or excessive tardies/ absences)

9th Grade

 No Work Permits will be issued (except for on-campus jobs)

During the summer all students are eligible for work permits.

EXTRAEXTRA***EXTRA***EXTRA*** NEW SDSU INFORMATION IMPORTANT FOR ALL GRADES!!!!

SDSU received 61,800 applications for approximately 6,158 slots. All students, when applying, must declare a major. All majors are impacted, so applications will be ranked by major. The in-service area (Point Loma High students) average GPA 3.65, average SAT 1074 and average CSU eligibility

index 4002 (compared with 2900 minimum to be eligible). Local students were provided on average 381 extra points. CSU eligible freshman from the local service area will have the option to be put on the waitlist. Students who were denied admittance, but CSU eligible are encouraged to enroll in a special transfer admittance guarantee program. If you enroll in a community college in the local area and complete the required courses and requirements for transferring, you will be guaranteed acceptance to SDSU for three years by fall 2013. Even if you have been accepted, SDSU will not enroll any student with any Ds or Fs in the senior year. This is for any course, even PE! Academic grades at all grade levels are very important. Don't wait to improve your grades — do it now! Be sure to send in your deposit on time and take ELM/EPT if you need it for acceptance. Seniors, see your counselor if you have any questions. CSU Maritime is still accepting applications!

"NOW WHAT?" Making the Final Selection of College*

After receiving admission offers, students should celebrate with friends, family, and teachers! It's a great time to be proud of four years' worth of achievements. Then, as seniors begin to consider their college options, it's always important to remember that they're not just choosing a school, but also a community that should feel like home. That's why spring is a great time to make a campus visit.

Finding a Community That Fits: Even if seniors have visited campus before they applied, visiting after being admitted can help them make their final choice. Many universities offer special events for admitted students and families. It's always nice to balance official campus events with informal opportunities to get a feel for the campus community. Campus events may include an informational session, campus tour, and meetings with professors. Informal ways to get to know a school could include going to lunch at a dining location, exploring the student center, or attending an athletic event or club meeting. Families can also use free time to explore the city by visiting local restaurants, museums, and cultural attractions.

Taking Care of the Details: Freshman residence halls are an important stop during any campus visit, and students should consider the types that are available. Because this often is their first time living away from home, students shouldn't rush through the housing forms; spending some time thinking about living preferences and being candid about preferences can make for an easier transition. By taking some time in the spring to get to know the colleges, campus life, and housing, students can make informed decisions as they select the college or university that will be a good fit for them.

THE SOCIAL TRANSITION FROM HIGH SCHOOL TO COLLEGE

Teens in high school are drinking more than ever and starting drinking at even younger ages. The incidence of high-risk drinking only increases in college when children find themselves with new freedom away from watchful eyes of parents consider these facts:

- * Student who chose not to drink during high school will often start during their first year of college. Moderate high school drinkers often become heavy drinkers in college.
- * Teens who use alcohol before the age of 15 are four times more likely to be alcohol dependent than adults whose first drink is at the legal age of 21.



 Each fall, 15 million students enroll in college. Nearly

160,000 of today's first year college students leave school every year for alcohol and other drug related reasons.

COLLEGE INSURANCE COVERAGE

If your kids are heading off to college, especially for the first time, you probably need to fine-tune your insurance coverage. Your auto premiums should drop if your child doesn't take a family car to school, assuming the college is more than 100 miles away. For students with cars on campus, notify your insurer of the new location. If it's out of state, make sure you comply with that state's laws for minimum coverage. If your child has at least a B average, ask for good-student discount.

For a child living in a dorm, your homeowner's policy may cover personal belongings up to 10% of your own content coverage. If you need more, you can purchase a rider. Students in off-campus-housing will need renter's insurance for property and liability. Roommates often can share a policy. Your health insurance covers unmarried children who are full-time students up to age 20 to 25, depending on the insurer. If you're in an HMO, make sure the college is within your service area. When your children reach the age limit, or get married, they qualify for COBRA coverage through your employer.

TIPS FOR SENIOR PARENTS ON LETTING GO

The Emotional Roller Coaster: Recognize your student's conflicting emotions. Your student, like you, is being pulled between past, present and future. One day exclaiming, "Leave me alone; I'm 18 years old, and independent," and the next complaining, "You're never around when I need you!" Your student's ups and downs are a sign of the ambivalence of the transitional time.

This Summer: Make a financial plan and discuss expectations with your student. Develop a tentative budget and be clear about who will pay for what. For example, some parents pay for tuition, room/board, books and supplies, while their student is responsible for incidental expenses such as snacks, movies and CD's. Other students are responsible for earning a percentage of their tuition. Teach your student about responsible use of credit and debit cards.

Communication: Keeping in touch once they're at college - Ask about courses, rather than focusing on grades. Invite your student to share with you the discovery of new ideas, academic interests and intellectual passions.

PLAN AHEAD FOR YOUR COLLEGE FUTURE!

Yes, even underclass students can take action to prepare for college. Here are some tips high school students can take during the next few months provided by the National Association for College Admission Counseling.

Senior Students:

Spring is a very rewarding time as our students begin receiving their college acceptances. It is very gratifying to hear students joyfully exclaim they were accepted to X, Y, or Z College or University. In all the excitement, it is easy for seniors to forget to complete their **intent to register forms by May 1st** and to follow all procedures from the college regarding securing student housing. Many colleges require students to take English and/or Math placement tests prior to enrollment. It is important to read **all information** sent to them from the colleges so they don't miss out on important deadlines.

PLHS community scholarships were due March 26th; late applications were not accepted! Seniors will continue to have the opportunity to apply for many scholarships. Notification is given to students via Naviance. Please notify Mrs. Hurl of any scholarships received for recognition at the Senior Awards Night by dropping off a copy of verification.

THINGS TO DO IN APRIL

Expect Admission Decisions

Chances are you will be accepted (or put on a waiting list) at some colleges and not others. Congratulate yourself on your acceptances. Way to go!

- Decide which college to go to.
 - Consider all the pros and cons.
 - Get the opinions of your parent(s) and counselor.
 - When comparing financial aid offers, look at the kinds of aid offered (for example, loans versus grants) not just the total amount.
 - Let your counseling or college planning office know of your final decision.

Reply to colleges.

- Notify the college you chose of your decision. Send a deposit, if needed. Watch deadlines. Mark them on this calendar. Most colleges may require deposits by May 1.
- After making sure everything is in order with the college you choose, write a polite letter to the colleges that you did not choose. Thank them for their offer. Do this promptly so they can offer admission to another student.

Tips of the month

\$\$\$: Get into the habit of working with a financial budget. Set a spending limit and savings goal based on your monthly income (allowances, after-tax pay, etc.). Put your savings amount away. Then prioritize how you want to use the rest of your money. That way, you can have what you really want and still save money! Look for a summer job or internship to offset the cost of college.

Going to the prom? Have fun and be smart. Remember that alcohol and other drugs can lead you take risks you may regret later. Buckle up and don't let anyone pressure you into doing something you don't want to do.

THINGS TO DO IN MAY

Thank staff members who wrote recommendations.

Consider giving them a thank-you note or card.

- ***** Keep in touch with wait-list schools you would still like to attend.
 - Consider writing a letter to express your enthusiasm for attending.
 - Let the colleges know of significant recent achievements, such as high grades, awards or honors.
- Make plans for the summer and beyond.
 - Forms regarding housing, roommates, courses, etc., may start arriving from the college you'll be attending. Respond to all of these promptly.

Stay focused and keep studying—only a couple more months to go!

Junior Students:

March: If you haven't logged into the Naviance program yet, now is the time to start. Use the internet to request admissions literature and financial aid information from the colleges on your list. There is no charge and no obligation to obtain general information about admission and financial aid.

April: Register for the May/June SAT Reasoning Test and/or the May/June SAT Subject Tests. Register for the June ACT if you want to take that test. Continue to evaluate your list of colleges and universities. Eliminate colleges from the original list that no longer interest you and add others as appropriate. Look into summer jobs or apply for special summer academic or enrichment programs. Colleges love to see students using their knowledge and developing their skills and interests. Take the **STAR testing seriously**. It is to their advantage to take the **voluntary Early Assessment Program Exam**. If they are proficient, they may pass the entrance requirements for Math and English at the CSU system and will not have to take the ELM/EPT.

May: Get a jump start on summer activities — consider enrolling in an academic course at a local college, pursuing a summer school program, applying for an internship, working or volunteering. If you work, save part of your earnings for college. Begin visiting colleges. Phone to set up appointments. Interviews are always a good idea. Many colleges will tell you they are optional, but an interview will show interest, enthusiasm, and initiative on your part and provide an excellent opportunity to have your questions answered. Do a practice interview with your family, employer, or a senior who has had college interviews. Set up interviews as early as possible — interview times become booked quickly! Take the SAT Reasoning Test or the SAT Subject Tests.

June: After school ends, get on the road to visit colleges. Seeing the college firsthand, taking a tour and talking to students can be the greatest help in deciding whether or not a school is right for you. Although it is ideal to visit colleges during the academic year, going in the summer will be valuable. Admission offices employ their students to give tours and answer questions from prospective students and their parents. Take the SAT Reasoning Test, the SAT Subject Tests, and/or the ACT.

July: Visit colleges, take tours, have interviews, and ask questions. Make college visiting a family event. Involve your parents and siblings in every step of your application process. Choosing the right college is a tough decision; the opinions of those who know you best can provide helpful insight into which college is best for you.

August: If you plan to play Division I or II athletics in college, you will need to visit the NCAA Eligibility Center website, <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u>, to fill out the NCAA eligibility form. Provide Mrs. Hurl with two envelopes stamped and addressed to the Eligibility Center. See Laurie Hurl if you have any questions.

COLLEGE CAMPUS VISIT ADVICE:

Juniors should visit during spring and summer months. If you're considering a summer visit, check with the college first. Some campuses are dead in the summer; others have summer program for juniors or summer school. Attend an information session and/or interview, tour campus, visit classes, talk with students and faculty, meet with a coach, and eat on campus. Consider staying overnight in the residence halls. Make good use of the summer. Consider taking a course that you can apply toward college. Explore volunteering, internships and job possibilities. Spend time with your family and friends.

Sophomore Students:

The UC system will not have SAT Subject Tests as criteria for admittance, however many private colleges require three SAT Subject Tests. These are one-hour exams testing you on academic subjects that you have already completed. Not all SAT Subject Tests are given on every test date. Check the calendar carefully to determine when the Subject Tests you want are offered. Summer: During the summer, you may want to sign up for a PSAT/SAT prep course, use computer software, or do the practice tests in books designed to familiarize you with standardized tests. Make your summer productive. Continue reading to increase your vocabulary.

FRESHMEN YEAR COLLEGE PLANNING

- Start strong and post solid grades.
- Get involved in after-school activities this is your opportunity to try out a few different options. At least one should be social or community service.
- Plan your 10th grade schedule if you have done well in your freshmen classes, consider honors or advanced courses.



It's been a long haul for the Point Loma High School Instrumental Music program – and their hard work has paid off! After struggling to keep the instrumental music program alive for the past seven years – growing from 35 students in a single band ensemble to over 150 students in a vibrant and growing program that now offers Vanguard (Marching Band), Symphonic Winds, Concert Band, Jazz Band, Orchestra, Dance Company, Color Guard and AP Theory – the Point Loma High School Instrumental Music program is poised to move from its overcrowded classroom to a state-of-the-art Music Center at the beginning of 2011.

"We've been running at the bare minimum for a long time," said James Sepulvado, Director of Instrumental Music at Point Loma High School. "We're ready to take the program to the next level."

The students have kept up their part of the bargain by taking their performance quality to the next level. The marching band and guard have won numerous awards, students have learned invaluable leadership skills, and they have become good-will ambassadors for their high school. They are ready to have a space that is an outward expression of the program's excellence and the importance of music education; a reward for the long haul.

The 2,500 square foot Music Center will have sound-isolated practice rooms, a choir room, a music production and recording studio, offices and classrooms. The Center will generate revenue for the school in the form of rental fees for the recording and practice studios. But the Center won't come pre-stocked. After the doors are open, the department will still need PA equipment, orchestra instruments and music, computer carts, music carts, shelves lockers, and recording equipment – just to name a few.

To ensure that the Music Center is adequately equipped and that the program's operational budget is fully funded, the Instrumental Music Program is holding its 3rd Annual *Rhapsody on the Point*, a concert and fundraiser at Crill Hall at Point Loma Nazarene University.

More than a fundraiser, *Rhapsody* is an opportunity for the community to come together and experience the outstanding PLHS band and Symphony Orchestra. Guest performer Dr. Todd Rewoldt, chairman of Woodwinds Studies at San Diego State University, will round out the evening with his soulful saxophone. Dr. Rewoldt is Assistant Professor of Saxophone at San Diego State University, and on-call saxophonist for the San Diego Symphony Orchestra and the La Jolla Music Society SummerFest.

Rhapsody on the Point promises to be a showcase of student achievement in music and a bellweather for the promising future of the PLHS Music program.

Facts about Music at PLHS:

- The PLHS Instrumental Music Department receives no funds from the School District other than the Director's salary.
- Running a program of this quality and size costs \$70,000 annually. This means that the program must raise money to purchase everything from reeds and music to transportation and instruments.
- Instrumental music programs provide all of the "big instruments" to the students. These include: string basses, cellos, sousaphones and percussion equipment. A new sousaphone costs \$6,000 (the band is currently borrowing one).
- The program currently doesn't have a PA system for marching band rehearsals. This poses a challenge with the band's proximity to the airport.
- Among the band's needs:
 - A "pit cart" to transport "pit instruments," which include timpani, marimba, and xylophone;
 - Color Guard equipment, which includes new rifles, flags, and a cart for hauling a heavy floor for spring competitions;
 - A new music library for the orchestra which currently has only 16 pieces;
 - New orchestra instruments;
 - A podium and stand for the new Music Center;
 - Computer carts;
 - Shelves; and
 - Recording equipment, microphones and stands.

This year Point Loma High School added a new position, an English Learner Support Teacher (ELST), to support the English learners on our campus. We currently have 225 students designated as English learners who fall between the Beginner (new to the country and to English) and Advanced range of language learning. While most of our English learners come from Mexico, we have students from Peru, Brazil, China, Taiwan, Japan, Iran, India, as well as other countries. These students are working twice as hard, learning the English language while they learn all of the content matter expected at each grade level.

We offer ESL as a two-hour block to support the language learning of our newest arrivals, as well as a literacy support class for our 9th

grade students in need of further English language development. In addition, we will be offering the computer program, Rosetta Stone in order to enrich, support and speed up the language learning process for our most beginning ESL students. We also have tutors assigned to certain core content classes to support our English learners, as well as after school tutoring provided by the ELST as part of the Upper Level Club for these students.

Our English learner parents have formed an ELAC (English Learner Advisory Committee) that meets monthly to discuss issues relevant to our English learners and to give advice to the school regarding programs and services for these students. The committee meets on the first Tuesday of the month at 5:30 p.m. in Room 301. It is open to all parents of English learners as well as any parent or community member interested in English learner programs, services and issues. Our officers are: Maria Lourdes Gutierrez, President, Gladis Alcantar, Vice-President, Norma Calzado, Secretary and Maria Sandoval, DELAC representative.


This spring, approximately 50 of our current English learners are up for redesdignation to a status of Reclassified Fluent English Proficient (RFEP). This means that they have reached several important milestones in their language development as assessed on the California English Language Development Test (CELDT) and California Standards Tests (CST). They are now ready to participate in a mainstream curriculum without additional language supports. We should all be very proud of these students and their accomplishments.
